

College at a Glance

Students' Council

The Students' Council is the apex academic student representative body of the college formed to work for the welfare of students by actively organizing academic events and coordinating at the University level. The Students' Council of Maharaja Agrasen College, unlike other student unions, is elected on the basis of academic merit, good attendance, and other extraordinary qualities present in students. Library

ICT Centre

The Centre caters to the curriculum requirements of computer practical for various courses of study in the college. Alongside, the centre also runs a dedicated general purpose computer lab where faculty, students and staff can utilize computing facilities at their convenience. The general purpose lab provides a heterogeneous environment with Windows 7, Mac OS X and Linux Operating System. The Centre also provides a secure Wi-Fi network to all the students, staff and faculty members of the college.

Media Centre

The college has a fully functional Media Centre with high definition equipment and in-house professional expertise in order to impart pre-production and post-production training to students of Journalism. Besides, it is also used for film screenings, short film making workshops and conducting seminars on different aspects of media studies and journalism.

Auditorium

The high tech auditorium is housed in a separate complex spread over three floors it has the capacity to accommodate 700 students. The Auditorium is the hub of all cultural and extracurricular activities in the forthcoming academic session.

Conference Room

The ultra-modern Conference Room of the College has an excellent sound system, overhead projector and other facilities. The conference room has enabled successful hosting of International Conferences, National Conferences and Students Congress along with facilitating student presentations as a matter of course.

Girls' Hostel

In any institution, a residential accommodation for students, especially girls, is always an asset. The MAC Girls' Hostel can house 50 students on three floors and has separate areas for dining and common room on the ground floor. Besides, a pantry has been provided on each floor. The Hostel is fitted with several amenities like television, washing machine, water heaters, ironing facilities, electric stove etc. The hostel is Wi-Fi enabled and computers are available for the use of the residents.

Admissions to the Hostel take place strictly on the basis of merit.

Sports Facilities

Maharaja Agrasen College provides diverse sports facilities with coaching and support to its students to participate in competitions as well as to pursue interest in sports. The college provides training in Athletics, Archery, Basketball, Badminton, Chess, Cricket, Cycling, Soccer, Korfball, Softball, Volley Ball and Wushu. The Sports Committee of the college, in charge of supervising sports activities, organizes various sports and adventure activities regularly for the students, Teaching Staff and Non-Teaching Staff. The college also organizes its Annual Sports Festival, 'SPARDHA', where inter college sports competitions are held.

It aims the girl students of the surrounding areas to receive quality education and earn the prestigious degree from the University Of Delhi.

Centre for Performing Arts and Cultural Studies

Guidelines of admission

The following guidelines of admission to various undergraduate courses for the academic session 2015-2016 will be followed:

- 1. Candidates interested in seeking admission to the undergraduate courses in the University are required to fill the common pre-admission form either online or offline for all categories (General /OBC/SC/ST/PWD). This is mandatory for all candidates. There will be no pre-admission form at the college level.
- 2. The candidates are followed to fill only one common pre-admission from either online or offline.
- 3. The college will convey the cut off marks for the various courses (for the General/OBC/SC/ST/PWD categories) to the office of Registrar, as per the schedule announced by the University.
- 4. Student is advised to visit http//du.ac.in for detailed information. The college will admit all the candidates who have percentage that meet the announced cut- off criteria. No first-come –first served policy is adopted.
- 5. After declaration of the cut off lists by the University, the candidate will need to report to the college for admission within the stipulated period. At this stage, the candidate would be required to fill the college admission form and the University enrolment form. The candidate would then get his/her documents verified, submit the same to the college and pay the admission fees.
- 6. (A) The candidates who could not take admission in a cut-off list could be considered for admission in the immediate next list only on the last date of admission provided seats are available in the college/course.
 - (B) For Boards, whose results are declared late, candidate may be considered in whichever cutoff list their results are declared subject to availability of seats, provided the candidate had completed pre – registration process.
- 7. The college will retain the certificates of the candidate during the admission process and shall return the documents in case, he /she cancels his admission or has to appear in counseling of any other university/institute or in order to move to another college on declaration of a subsequent cut off lists.
- 8. No student will be allowed to take admission in two courses/colleges simultaneously. In case, a candidate is found admitted in two courses/colleges simultaneously, the admission in all courses/college will be cancelled.
- 9. For admission under the reserved categories of Children/ Widows of eligible Armed Forces Personnel/Kashmiri Migrants, the admission process shall continue to be centralized and conducted at the University level by the office of Joint Registrar (Academic). The schedule of registration/admission for admission under these categories shall be notified on the University's Website www.du.ac.in.
- 10. All those candidates who are covered under any of the categories of reservation for children of Armed Forces Personnel/Kashmiri Migrants must register separately online/ offline if they wish to be considered for any other category (Gen/OBC/SC/ST/PWD).

- 11. For BMS Course admission will be done through entrance examinations.
- 12. For admission under the sports and ECA (Extra Curricular Activities) categories applications forms may be obtained from the college (visit http/du.ac.in)

Annexure 1

- 1. Procedure for calculation of "Best of Four" subjects percentage for Honours Courses (For admission to Arts/Humanities Courses):
 - A. One Language (Core/Elective/Functional)
 - B. The subject in which admission is sought (If a candidate does not include the concerned subject whether studied or not in Best of four in which he/she is seeking admission in the honours course, then a disadvantage of 2.5% May be imposed on the calculated Best of four percentage).
 - C. Any two other academic/elective subjects as per List A. (If a candidate does' t include the subjects given in List A in Best of Four, then A disadvantage of 2.5% in Best of four each subject may be imposed.

List A

The following Discipline subjects offered by the University of Delhi for admission to undergraduate courses must be treated as Academic /Elective subjects for the purpose of undergraduate admission. All the other subjects offered by different boards may be treated as non – elective .All the Discipline subjects must have at least a 70% component of theory exams (theory exam does not include internal assessment / continuous evaluation etc.) in the qualifying exam for the purpose of being treated as academic/elective subject.

- 1. *Accountancy will be treated as equivalent to Commerce wherever any board is not offering commerce as a subject.
- 2. Biology/Biotechnology and Business Studies will be treated as academic/elective subjects.
- 3. #Music and #Physical Education will be treated as academic/elective only for Honours in Music and Physical Education, respectively.

- 4. In case a candidate has studied both elective and core in any language, then core language will be treated as language, while elective language can be considered as academic/elective subject.
- 5. Admission to B.A (Hons.) Journalism will be based on "Best of four" percentage as B.A (Hons.) English.
- 6. The subject "Informatics Practices" will be equivalent to Computer Science for admission to B.SC. (Hons.) Computer Science only.
- 7. (A) For admission to Honours in any Language course, advantage of 2% in the Best of Four percentage may be given to those candidates who have studied the elective language.
 - (B) In case, a candidate has not studied the language at qualifying exam and is seeking admission to Honours in that language, he/she May be given a disadvantage of 5% in Best of Four percentage.
 - (C) For admission to Honours in English and Hindi, the candidate must have studied and passed the respective language in the qualifying exam and to be included for calculation of best of four percentages.
- 8. University may define any other relevant subjects as academic/elective for a particular Honours course.

Procedure for calculation of "Best of Four" subjects percentage for B.A. (Prog.) /B.Com (Prog.):

- A. One Language (Core/Elective/Functional)
- B. Any three elective subjects can be chosen .A disadvantage of upto 5% * on Best of Four percentage may be imposed if there is a change of stream.
- C. For admission to B.A. (Vocational) only, related vocational subjects may be treated at par with academic/elective subjects.
- D. If a candidate opts for MIL (Except Hindi) as a subject, an advantage of up to 10% may be given in Best of Four in those colleges where MIL is offered as a subject.

*The college will have to notify the actual deduction up to 5% before hand by uploading on their website and intimating the same to the University.

Admission to Science Courses

The Basis of Selection for Mathematical Sciences/Science/Home Science courses remains unchanged. However the subjects to be included for Basis of Selection (PCM/PCB/PCMB) must have at least 70% component of theory exams (theory exam does not include internal assessment/continuous evaluation etc.) in the qualifying exam otherwise a disadvantage of 10% of the maximum marks may be levied on each such subject.

Please note the following points before submitting admission forms:

- 1. Admissions are made on merit basis and admission to a course is closed as soon as the seats are filled. Information in this regard will be notified on the College notice board / website.
- 2. Admission Forms incomplete in any respect are liable to be rejected. The College reserves the right to refuse admission to any student without assigning any reason thereof.
- 3. Students who have passed 10+2 or equivalent examination will be considered for admission. The aggregate marks to be determined for admission will be for three elective subjects and one language at the+2 level. Students seeking admission to this college will have to bring their

parents / guardians at the time of counseling for admission.

- 4. Admission to all courses is provisional, subject to confirmation by the University under its rules. All applicants seeking admission to the College should follow university guidelines and notifictions.
- 5. For admission or re-admission, the College will follow regulations set by the University of Delhi for the year 2015-16 in its Bulletin of Information.
- 6. Admission forms will be accepted in the college on working days between 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. The last date and time for submission of application form is notified separately.
- 7. All information regarding cut-offs to various courses will be put up on the College notice board. Applicants should look up the College notice board and the college website: www.mac.du.ac.in for all information regarding admissions.
- 8. Once a decision on a candidate's case is taken, the college will not entertain any personal representation, correspondence or telephonic inquiries on the subject.
- 9. A total of 5% of seats are reserved for sports and ECA quota (subject-wise), as per university rules. The Colleges is however free to decide the actual number of seats to be filled on sports basis (not more than 5%) keeping in view the facilities available, requirement of the College and other relevant factors. Reservations for persons with Disabilities will also apply as per university guidelines and as mentioned in college prospectus.
- 10. Whil drawing the merit list for admissions to various courses, subjects with accordance with university guidelines 2015 will be taken into account. Advantage or disadvantage to be imposed on calculation of best of four subjects will also be applied accordingly. All further details will be notified on college website.
- 11. In case the candidate is selected for admission, originals of the following certificates along with self-attested copies will have to be submitted to the college at the time of admission:
 - i) A character certificate from the Head of the College or School last attended.
 - ii) A matriculation certificate for confirmation of date of birth.
 - iii) Provisional certificate of the last examination passed.
 - iv) A list of marks obtained in each subject at the last examination passed.
 - v) Four passport size recent photographs of the student.
- 12. Following Examinations are recognized equivalent to the senior school Certificate Examination:
 - A. Senior School Certificate Examination (Class XII) of the Central Board of Secondary

Education, Delhi or any examination recognized as equivalent thereto.

OR

Pre-University Examination (2 years) after ten years schooling, conducted by an Indian University recognized by University of Delhi.

OR

Intermediate Examination of an Indian University/Board or an examination recognized as equivalent thereto.

- B. Indian School Certificate Examination (Class XII) of the council of Indian School Certificate Examination, New Delhi.
- C. General Certificate of Education Examination of U.K. (Pass in five subjects or ordinary level).
- 13. Candidates belonging to the Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe are required to get their names registered with the University Office. Thereafter they should apply to the college directly in accordance with the schedule of admission. They should clearly mention on the top of the admission form that they belong to SC/ST or any other category for which the Government of India makes reservations. Candidates who are seeking admission under this' category shall be requested to submit a certificate from the Principal of the school institution last attended to the effect that he/she belongs to Scheduled Cast/Scheduled Tribe and was enjoying all benefits available to SC/ST students along with a certificate issued by the District Magistrate or the competent authority appointed for the purpose.
- 14. Candidates claiming the benefit of being the children of the officers and men of the Armed Forces killed or disabled in war / Kashmiri Migrants are requested to get their names registered with the University Office.
- 15. Admission of foreign students is handled by the Foreign Student's Advisor, Foreign Students Registrar. C/o Faculty of Management Studies. University of Delhi, Delhi- 110007. No foreign student is admitted directly by the college unless he/she produces a eligibility and clearance of his/her holding student's visa. Admission of foreign students will be done on first come first serve basis till the quota prescribed by the University is exhausted.
- 16. Applicants who fail to deposit the prescribed fee within the period in the admission notice shall not be granted admission.
- 17. Seeking admission on basis of misinterpretation by submitting false certificates/documents is unlawful and will lead to cancellation of admission.
- 18. The College reserves the right to refuse admission to any student without assigning any reason thereof. All applicants seeking admission to the college should read the Bulletin of Information issued by the University of Delhi.

ACADEMIC CONDUCT

ATTENDANCE


- 1. All Courses taught in the college shall be taught in the Semester System as per University of Delhi Guidelines and Curricula.
- 2. According to Ordinance VII (2)* of the University of Delhi, a FYUP candidate for the Semester I/III/V/VII Examination shall not be deemed to have satisfied the required conditions of attendance unless s/he has attended, in all the subjects taken together, **not less than two thirds** of the lectures/practical/presentations/tutorials required to be attended provided that a student of the Semester I/III/V/VII who does not fulfil the required conditions of attendance, as above, but has attended, in all the subjects taken together, not less than 40 per cent ofl ectures/ practical/presentations during the respective semester, may at the discretion of the Principal of the College concerned, appear for the ensuing semester Examination; but such a candidate shall be required to make up the deficiency at lectures and practicals, in the next semester of the same academic year.
- 3. The **Principal of the College shall have the power to detain a student** in the same class in which he has been studying, or not to send him up for the University Examination, **in case he did not appear at the tests afore said or his performance was not satisfactory**. The Principal of a College/Head of the Institution shall have power to strike off the name of a student who is grossly irregular in attendance in spite of warning, or when the absence of the student is for such a long period that he cannot put in requisite percentage of attendance.

DISCIPLINE

1. Students are responsible for their conduct to the Principal and are prohibited from doing anything, either inside the college or outside, that will amount to breach of discipline or interference in the normal working of the college. Astudent will be liable to disciplinary action for violation of any of the rules of discipline. Disciplinary actions may involve warning and/ or fines and/or suspension from the class, from examination, from use of the college library or even expulsion from the college as such or any such action as provided in ordinance XV-B, XV-C and XV-D of the rules of discipline of the University of Delhi. Disciplinary action may also involve non-issuance of character certificate when the student exits the course.

- 2. Students shall conduct themselves in a disciplined manner both towards the members of the staff (Teaching and Non -Teaching) and towards their fellow students. In addition, unbecoming language or rude conduct shall be severely dealt with in accordance with the provisions leading to fine/suspension/expulsion from the college as deemed fit by the Principal.
- 3. Students shall maintain perfect discipline in class-rooms and desist from demonstration of disorderly behavior. They must not loiter in corridors or in front of class rooms or office rooms and must maintain silence. During their free periods, students must work quietly in the library or reading room but without causing any disturbance. Smoking in the College premises i.e. lawns, canteen, auditorium, class-rooms, corridors, staircases, library and reading room is strictly prohibited. Use of mobile phones and other audio devices are strictly prohibited in and around the class rooms. These will be confiscated by the college authorities and will be returned only at the end of the semester.
- 4. Students shall take proper care of the college property and they must not spoil or cause any damage to or tamper or displace with college property, furniture, fitting etc. They shall not spoil the lawns. Students will have to pay the cost of damage/loss caused to the property of the college.
- 5. Students shall leave their vehicles locked in the space provided for this purpose. No vehicle shall be left in any space other than the specified one. The College will not be responsible for any damage or loss on this account.
- 6. No society can be formed in the college without the permission of the Principal. No person can be invited to address a meeting in the college or allowed to enter college without the prior permission of the Principal or allowed to use the name of the Principal or his office in any form as specified above.
- 7. No student suffering from any contagious or infectious disease will be permitted to attend the college.
- 8. Any student who is found impersonating or allowing impersonation on his/her behalf at the University Examination will stand expelled from the college with immediate effect. No letter calling for explanation or show cause notice will be issued to such student. No such student will be readmitted to the college.
- 9. Outsiders are not allowed inside the college premises without permission of the college authorities. For the students, there shall be identity card entry in the college and they must produce their identity cards when asked.
- 10. Smoking and consumption of alcohol is strictly prohibited inside the college campus.
- 11. Barring clause 7, violations of the above mentioned rules will lead to severe disciplinary action involving fine, suspension and expulsion from the college. The Principal can take such action even without assigning any reason.

ANTI-RAGGING MEASURES AT MAHARAJA AGRASEN COLLEGE

12. To maintain a clean and green environment the use of plastic bags is discouraged in the college campus. Ragging is totally prohibited in Maharaja Agrasen College as per the guidelines of University of Delhi (Ordinance XV-C). Anyone found guilty of ragging and/or abetting ragging whether actively or passively, or being a part of conspiracy to promote ragging, is liable to be punished in accordance with UGC Regulations 2009 as well as under the provisions of any penal law for the time being in force.

As per UGC Regulations on curbing the menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009, ragging constitutes one ormore of any of following acts:

- I. Any conduct by any student or students whether by words spoken or written or by any act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student.
- II. Indulging in rowdy or indiscipline activities by any student or students which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship, physical or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any other student
- III. Asking any student to do any act which such student will not in the ordinary course do and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame, or torment or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of such fresher or any other student.
- IV. Any act by senior student that prevents, disrupts or disturbs the regular academic activity of any other student or a fresher.
- V. Exploiting the service of a fresher or any other student for completing the academic tasks assigned to an individual or a group of students.
- VI. Any act of financial extortion or forceful expenditure burden put on a fresher or any other student by students.
- VII. Any act of physical abuse including all variants of it: sexual abuse, homosexual assaults, stripping, forcing obscene and led acts, gestures, causing bodily harm or any other danger to health of person.
- VIII. Any act or abuse by spoken words, email, post, public insults which would also include deriving perverted pleasure, vicarious or sadistic thrill from activity or passively participating in the discomfiture to fresher or any other student.
- IX. Any act that affects the mental health and self-confidence of a fresher or any other student with or without an intent to derive a sadistic pleasure or showing off power, authority or superiority by a student over any fresher or any other student.

ADMINISTRATION'S ACTIONS IN THE EVENT OF RAGGING

The Anti-Ragging Committee may punish a student found guilty of ragging with one or more of the Following punishments:-

- I. Suspension from attending classes and academic privileges
- II. Withholding/withdrawing scholarship/fellowship and other benefits
- III. Debarring from appearing in any test/examination or other evaluation process
- IV. Withholding marks
- V. Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national or international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.
- VI. Suspension/expulsion from the hostel
- VII. Cancellation of admission
- VIII. Rustication from the institution
- IX. Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution for a specific period. Proved that where the persons committing or abetting the act of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment.

The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 (MINISTRY OF LAW AND JUSTICE)

An Act to provide protection against sexual harassment of women at workplace and for the prevention and redressed of complaints of sexual harassment and for matters connected therewith incidental thereto.

WHEREAS sexual harassment results in violation of the fundamental rights of a woman to equality under articles 14 and 15 of the Constitution of India and her right to life and to live with dignity under article 21 of the Constitution and right to practice any profession or to carry on any occupation, trade or business which includes a right to a safe environment free from sexual harassment; AND WHEREAS the protection against sexual harassment and the right to work with dignity are universally recognized human rights by international conventions and instruments such as Convention on the Elimination of all forms of discrimination against Women, which has been ratified on the 25th June, 1993 by the Government of India. AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make provisions for giving effect to the said Convention for protection of women against sexual harassment at workplace.
