- b) Critically examine Spenser's attempt to create a non-linear and reflexive narration in *The Faerie Queene* Book VI What reasons can you give for this attempt?
- 5. a) Analyse the subtle combination of the philosophical and the ecological in Marvell's poems

OR

- b) "The Metaphysical poets revel in using the language of love for religious themes and the language of religion for matters amatory" Do you agree? Answer with close reference to at least two poems.
- 6. a) "Satan's transgression is ultimately against the order of nature" Discuss
 OR
 - b) "For if Eve is Sin's as well as Satan's double, then Satan is to Eve what he is to Sin—both a lover and a daddy". Critically examine Gilbert and Gubar's statement in the light of the relationship between Satan and Eve in *Paradise Lost*.

c) Analyse the conflict between old philosophies and new in any two of the authors you have studied in this course.
