

# 2. ENGLISH - COMMUNICATIVE (CODE NO. 101)

This is two-year syllabus for classes IX and X. The CBSE has prepared a package for this syllabus called **Interact in English**. It includes the following:

For students For teachers

1. Main course book 1. Teacher's book

2. Literature Reader 2. Audio cassettes

3. Work book

Interact in English has been deisgned to develop the student's communicative competence in English. Therefore, content selection is determined by the student's present and future academic, social and professional needs.

#### The overall aims of the course are:

- (a) to enable the learner to communicate effectively and appropriately in real-life situations.
- (b) to use English effectively for study purpose across the curriculum.
- (c) to develop and integrate the use of the four language skills, i.e. listening, speaking, reading and writing.
- (d) to develop interest in and appreciation of literature.
- (e) to revise and reinforce structures already learnt.
- (d) to develop interest in the appreciation of literature.

Teachers may kindly keep the following in mind to develop these competencies:

Creativity: Students should be encouraged to think on their own and express their ideas using their experience, knowledge and imagination, rather than being text or teacher dependent.

Self-monitoring: Students should be encouraged to monitor their progress, space out their learning, so students should be encouraged to see language not just as a functional tool, but as an important part of personal development and inculcation of values.

By the end of the course, students should be able to:

1. read silently at varying speed depending on the purpose of reading;\*

- 9. analyse, interpret, infer (and evaluate\*) the ideas in the text;
- 10. select and extract from a text information required for a specific purpose (and record it in note form\*)
- 11. transcode information from verbal to diagrammatic form;
- 12. retrieve and synthesise information from a range of reference material using study skills such as skimming and scanning;\*
- 13. interpret texts by relating them to other material on the same theme (and to their own experience and knowledge\*); and
- 14. read extensively on their own.

### By the end of the course, students should be able to:

- express ideas in clear and grammatically correct english, using appropriate punctuation and cohesion devices;
- 2. write in a style appropriate for communicative purposes;
- plan, organise and present ideas coherently by introducing, developing and concluding a topic;
- 4. write a clear description (e.g. of a place, a person, an object or a system);
- 5. write a clear account of events (e.g. a process, a narrative, a trend or a cause effect relationship);
- 6. compare and contrast ideas and arrive at conclusions;

- 7. present an argument, supporting it with appropriate examples;

- 10. expand notes into a piece of writing;
- 11. summarise or make notes from a given text; and
- 12. recode information from one text type to another (e.g. diary entry to letter, advertisement to report, diagram to verbal form)

#### \*\* LISTENING

#### By the end of course, the students should be able to:

- 1. adopt different strategies according to the purpose of listening (e.g. for pleasure, for general interest, for specific information);
- 2. use linguistic and non-linguistic features of the context as clues to understanding and interpreting what is heard (e.g. cohesion devices, key words, intonation, gesture, background noises);
- 3. listen to a talk or conversation and understand the topic and main points;
- 4. listen for information required for a specific purpose, e.g. in radio broadcast, commentaries, airport and railway station announcements;
- 5. distinguish main points from supporting details, and relevant from irrelevant information;
- 6. understand and interpret messages conveyed in person or by telephone;
- 7. understand and respond appropriately to directive language, e.g. instruction, advice, requests and warning; and
- 8. understand and interpret spontaneous spoken discourse in familiar social situations.

### By the end of the course, students should be able to:

- speak intelligibly using appropriate word stress, sentence stress and intonation patterns;
- 2. adopt different strategies to convey ideas effectively according to purpose, topic and audience (including the appropriate use of polite expressions);
- 3. narrate incidents and events, real or imaginary; in a logical sequence;
- present oral reports or summaries and make announcements clearly and confidently;
- 5. express and argue a point of view clearly and effectively;

- 6. take active part in group discussions, showing ability to express agreement or disagreement, to summarise ideas, to elicit the views of others, and to present own ideas;
- 7. express and respond to personal feelings, opinions and attitudes;
- 8. convey messages effectively in person or by telephone;
- 9. frame questions so as to elicit the desired response, and respond appropriately to questions; and
- 10. participate in spontaneous spoken discourse in familiar social situations.

If the candidate exceeds the word limit by one or two words 1 mark will be deducted.

# 2. ENGLISH-LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE

(Code No. 184)

Objectives

The Terminal Learning outcomes of English Language and Literature are detailed below. It is expected that the student develops the following language skills at the end of the course and uses these languages skills in real life situations.

#### Listening Skills 1.

The ability to understand English when it is spoken

The student is able to:

- understand meaning of words, phrases and sentences on context;
- understand statements, questions, instructions and commands;
- follow directions given orally;
- iellew simple narratives and descriptions;
- grast the substance and central ideal of what is spoken;
- lister and understand radio broadcasts, T.V. programmes; and
- maintain his/her listening attention for a reasonable length of time.

#### Speaking Skills 2.

The ability to speak intelligibly;

The student is able to:

- pronounce English correctly and intelligibly;
- use appropriate word stress, sentence stress, and elementary intonation patterns;
- speak intelligibly while making statements, asking questions, giving instructions and commands, reporting events;
- put ideas in proper sequence;
- namete simple experiences and series of events to convey its essence and intention;
- describe accurately what he/she observes and experiences;
- converse in familiar social situations; and
- use polite expressions in appropriate ways e.g. Excuse me, I beg your pardon etc.

#### Reading Skills 3.

The ability to read English with understanding

The student is able to:

- anderstand the total content and the underlying meaning in the context;
- follow sequences of ideas; facts etc;
- lecate significant details;
- identify and understand phrases or sentence groups;
- make inferences:
- redict outcomes;
- grasp meanings of words and sentences from the context;
- acquire the ability to use a suitable dictionary;
- understand labels, simple notices and written instructions;

- consult sources of information such as time tables, catalogues and brochures, charts, graphs, adverstisements, pictrures, etc.
- form the habit of reading for pleasure and / or information;
- develop correct reading habits, silently, extensively and intensively;
- comprehend materials other than the prescribed text and
- comment on the passages read

The student is able to:

- master the mechanics of writing: the use of correct punctuation marks and capital letters;
- spell words correctly;
- write neatly and legibly with reasonable speed;
- use appropriate vocabulary
- use correct grammatical forms;
- write coherently in more than one paragraph;
- complete accurately and fluently semi-controlled compositions like stories, events, processes etc.
- write description of people, places and things and respond imaginatively to textual questions.
- write paragraphs, letters (personal and official), simple narrative pieces, reports, notices, messages, diary entries, etc.
- make notes and summarise
- edit written material
- expand notes.

### To the teachers

NOTE: Teachers are advised to:

- (i) encourage classroom interaction among peers, students and teachers through activities such as role play, group work etc.
- (ii) reduce teacher-talking time to the minimum.
