

Winning involves four important dimensions : Self-confidence, mental toughness, winning-oriented thinking and the ability to innovate. Selfconfidence stands on three important pillars : feeling good, taking responsibility and developing skills. Mental toughness implies that one does not succumb to pressures, either external or internal. External pressure includes peer pressure, that is, the pressure to conform to the values and behaviour of our equals. Internal pressure refers to the gnawing feeling of doubt that we experience at times when the struggle seems difficult. Winning-oriented thinking, as the term suggests, refers to developing the 'never say die' attitude. It implies the manifestation of two traits: a constant desire to aim for excellence and the endeavour to express one's inherent talents. Innovation is one of the hallmarks of success. One needs to keep upgrading one's skills and also responding to a situation in an appropriate manner with the tools available. As the saying goes, if life throws lemons (difficulties), one must have the ability to make lemonade. Innovation can be cultivated through focus, practice and inspiration.
