

Masters in Counseling -- Career Resources

What can I do with a Masters degree in Counseling?

A master's degree with a major in counseling psychology provides training for students who wish to work in private practice, universities and community colleges, industry, mental health and mental retardation centers, rehabilitation settings and hospitals. In many states, master's-level practitioners are required to work under the supervision of a licensed doctoral-level psychologist. With additional course work, graduates of the program may meet requirements for licensure as professional counselors or marriage and family therapists.

Social and Human Service Assistants (http://www.bls.gov/oco/ocos059.htm)

- While a bachelor's degree usually is not required, employers increasingly seek individuals with relevant work experience or education beyond high school.
- Employment is projected to grow much faster than average.
- Job opportunities should be excellent, particularly for applicants with appropriate postsecondary education, but pay is low.

Social Workers (http://www.bls.gov/oco/ocos060.htm)

- While a bachelor's degree is the minimum requirement, a master's degree in social work or a related field has become the standard for many positions.
- Employment is projected to grow faster than average.
- Competition for jobs is expected in cities, but opportunities should be good in rural areas.

Psychologists (http://www.bls.gov/oco/ocos056.htm)

- More than 1 out of 4 psychologists are self-employed—nearly four times the average for professional workers.
- Most specialists, including clinical and counseling psychologists, need a doctoral degree; school and industrial-organizational psychologists need a master's degree.
- Opportunities in psychology are *limited for those with only a bachelor's degree*.

Physicians and Surgeons (http://www.bls.gov/oco/ocos074.htm)

- Many physicians and surgeons work long, irregular hours; almost one-third of physicians worked 60 or more hours a week in 2002.
- New physicians are much less likely to enter solo practice and more likely to work as salaried employees of group medical practices, clinics, hospitals, or health networks.
- Formal education and training requirements are among the most demanding of any occupation, but earnings are among the highest.

Clergy (http://www.bls.gov/oco/oco20052.htm)

- Many denominations require that clergy complete a bachelor's degree and a graduate-level program of theological study; others will admit anyone who has been "called" to the vocation.
- Individuals considering a career in the clergy should realize they are choosing not only a career but also a
 way of life; members of the clergy typically work irregular hours and many put in longer than average work
 days.
- Opportunities are expected in all faiths, but in some denominations competition is likely for positions leading large urban worship groups.



Occupational Therapists (http://www.bls.gov/oco/ocos078.htm)

- Employment is projected to increase faster than the average, as rapid growth in the number of middleaged and elderly individuals increases the demand for therapeutic services.
- A bachelor's degree in occupational therapy is the minimum educational requirement; beginning in 2007, however, a master's degree or higher will be required.
- Occupational therapists are increasingly taking on supervisory roles.
